Precinct Leadership Meetings

- Plan Volunteer Programs
 - Develop a program to increase voter/caucus turnout. Keep the goal in sight during the off-season.
 - Set a specific % goal (e.g., increase turnout by 30%).
 - Create a short-term plan for the upcoming election (e.g., campaigning for Republican nominees).
 - Create a long-term plan for the following election season (e.g., educating voters about Republican principles).
 - Get people involved in volunteer efforts and they will be more motivated to vote.
 - Get more Republican voters to the polls in gubernatorial years to increase the number of delegates your precinct will receive at your next caucus.
 - Organize to help a Republican nominee, support or oppose a current issue or initiative, or educate voters about Republican principles.
 - Develop a signage map - identify best locations for signs in your precinct.
 - Organize a Meet-the-Candidate event or debate.
 - Research the opponent/opposition.
 - Organize neighborhood walks.
 - Identify talking points.
 - Plan materials for distribution.
 - Plan and organize neighborhood walks to:
 - Recruit support and/or volunteers.
 - Register voters.
 - Distribute material.
 - Invite voters to a precinct event.
 - Organize a community service/involvement project to bring attention to Republicans working together (e.g., to improve and support community projects, schools, businesses, etc.).
 - You might work with the Party PR/Media Officer to plan publicity.
 - You might use this as an opportunity to involve people who are not very interested in politics or the Republican Party.
 - Form a volunteer-based plan to communicate with residents of your precinct.
 - Flyers
 - Surveys
 - Newsletters
 - Door-to-Door
 - Phone calls
- Form a technology-based plan to communicate with residents of your precinct.
 - Email, Facebook, Twitter, etc
 - Electronic newsletter

- Web-based surveys
- Blog
- Plan effective publicity of precinct activity (e.g., events, volunteer efforts, etc).
- Plan outreach to youth.
 - Encourage precinct volunteers to accomplish their assignments as a family.
 - Get youth involved in volunteer programs. Give them their own simple assignments (e.g., deliver flyers to 10 neighbors).
 - Organize precinct events to educate and involve kids.
 - Go to high schools to register seniors to vote. (If the Party is organizing high school registration efforts across the county, you may want to join that effort to avoid duplicating efforts.)
 - Invite neighborhood Scout troops to perform flag ceremonies at precinct events.
- Plan a precinct social activity (e.g., bbq in the park).

Precinct-wide meetings

- Invite elected officials and/or Party Officers for a report and Q&A session with voters in the precinct.
 - State Senator
 - State House Representative
 - Federal delegation staff
 - County elected officials
 - Legislative District Chair, Vice Chair, Education Officer
- Discuss current issues
 - Issues Republicans in your precinct support and/or oppose.
 - Issues on which the County Party Central Committee has taken an official position.
 - Legislative bills your precinct would like to see submitted.
 - Study a current federal or state bill.
- Identify potential future candidates. Look for people who:
 - Are committed to conservative principles.
 - Support the Republican platform.
 - Are involved.
 - Are knowledgeable.
 - Speak and listen well.
 - Care about the community.
